

Infantry, Washington: Government Printing Office, 1891-5. 4to, contemporary cloth, 29 pp. (2 + 4 pp. indices tipped in), 178 double-page lithographic plates (numbered 1-175 and including 3 additional plates numbered 135A-C), mainly maps and plans (several to a sheet in most cases), but also including panoramas, costumes, etc., most printed in colours, binding worn and marked, infrequent damp-staining to lower margins (e.g. 1-10, 98-100, 150), plates 1-10 with discreet paper reinforcement to affected areas verso, plate 5 with short closed tear to foot, later plates (approx. 130 onward) with trivial bumping to lower fore corners, a few plates misbound (no. 31 bound after 35, 100 after 96, and 149 after 145; 154-5 transposed and bound after 160), 172 and 175 colouring offset, 174-5 nicked in fore margins (qty: 1)

Rare miniature county atlas. ESTC traces twelve copies in libraries world-wide and it is postulated that only 200 copies were printed. The maps are notable for being the first of the English and Welsh counties to show longitude and latitude.





Castellini), on wove paper (a few, e.g. 36, 'Pianello' and 54, 'Villa Passalacqua', watermarked 'J Whatman 1816'), many heightened in gum arabic, each with letterpress text-leaf (with post-horn watermarks), bound without title-page, plates not bound in numerical order, shallow damp-related paper-erosion to upper inner corners (never affecting images or text), variable damp-staining to lower margins of final 10 plates and text-leaves, a few instances of light marginal soiling elsewhere (qty: 1)

Robins, *The Exotic and the Beautiful*, 1026; Brunet V 1168.

According to Brunet the work was first published in 1815, with 50 colour plates. The plates in this copy are numbered up to 56 (with 5, 17, 20, 24, 44, 45 absent). Most copies to have appeared for sale have been dated 1818 on the title-page, and though the catalogue notes for these have generally suggested that 60 plates are called for, the actual counts have invariably been fewer (Christie's 2002, 49 plates; Sotheby's 2004, 40; Bonhams 2015, 50, uncoloured), and the Robins copy has 46 plates only.

Three photograph albums of RAF service in Egypt, c.1937-8. 3 albums, oblong folio (various dimensions), one in simulated snakeskin (some wear), two in limp tan leather with coloured Egyptian-themed vignettes to front covers (the Pyramids of Giza and the statue of Ferdinand de Lesseps at Port Said), containing in total approx. 390 gelatin silver prints corner-mounted rectos and versos on black card album leaves, personal snapshots and studio prints, various dimensions (90 x 60 mm to 240 x 180 mm), manuscript captions in white ink to mounts throughout, a few RAF menus also included, and 10 related photographs and a gilt-braided RAF cap badge laid in (qty: 3)

The photographer was evidently stationed at RAF Abu Sueir near Port Said. The photographs depict views, street scenes and the photographer's fellow officers in Alexandria, Cairo, Luxor, Karnak, Lake Timsah, Ismailia; many show life on base in Abu Sueir. There are numerous photographs of crashed planes, two images captioned 'Natives of the Ghikuyo tribe', and two captioned 'Headhunters and some native girls'. There are also coastal views of Malta.







Sir John Hunter Littler was a decorated East India Company army officer best remembered for his actions in the First Anglo-Sikh War (1845-6). 'At the close of the campaign he was appointed to command at Lahore. In 1848 he was appointed to the supreme council of India, and was made GCB and deputy governor of Bengal' (ODNB), retiring in 1851 as lieutenant-general. At the time of these voyages he held the rank of major. The first is from Calcutta to England (January-June 1824) on the ship Palmire, and the second is the return voyage from Gravesend to India on the Malcolm under one Captain Eyles (though the diary ends on 20 October 1826 before landfall is made, three months after setting out in June). In daily entries there is substantial description of conditions, wildlife sightings (including gannets, albatrosses, flying fish, porpoises, dolphins, sperm whales), on-board accidents and repairs, and encounters with other ships. The Palmire rounds the Cape of Good Hope on 24 March, shortly after which Littler is set ashore at Jamestown, St Helena ('Whilst Mr Harvey transacted business with Mr Solomon's House, Capt. S. & myself strolled about the town - being Sunday all shops were shut, & very few of the inhabitants visible'); on 24 April he visits Ascension and provides an extensive (4 pp.) description of the island's topography, the British garrison and a recent outbreak of yellow fever. The return journey includes a landfall at Funchal (10 July) and a detailed account of an affray between three private soldiers (12 July), about which Littler reflects that 'these petty disputes amongst the men which almost always commence by playing & jesting with each other, leading to practical jokes & terminating in blows, might be prevented by the non commission'd officers if timely noticed & check'd'.



THE LIBRARY, PICTURES AND CAMERA COLLECTION OF ERIC HOSKING OBE Hon. FRPS FBIPP (1909-1991)

Biography of Eric Hosking

'Perhaps the most famous bird photographer ever to have lived' (Gemma Padley, *Into the Wild: The Story of the World's Greatest Wildlife Photography*, 2021).

Eric Hosking was Britain's first professional wildlife photographer. Born in London, he took up photography freelance a few years after leaving school. He famously lost an eye to a tawny owl while climbing up to a hide in rural Wales at the age of 28, an event which remarkably proved no measurable hindrance to his career; the incident later inspired the ingenious title of his autobiography, *An Eye for a Bird* (1970), the foreword to which was written by HRH Prince Philip. Over his exceptionally long career he photographed over 1,800 species, and his pictures have appeared in some 1,000 books, including the popular *New Naturalist* series, of which he was photographic editor.

We are grateful to John Chillingworth Hon. FRPS for the following reflections on Eric Hosking's achievements:

'As he honed his skills, building his reputation as a wildlife photographer, Hosking battled with the problem of slow panchromatic emulsions. In 1935, he was the first natural history photographer to experiment with Sashalight flash bulbs and in the following year he took the first-ever flash photograph of an owl with its prey.'

Despised by 'serious' natural history photographers, Hosking found the Leica camera he bought in the same year to be a particularly useful addition to his armoury.

Pioneering a decade later, with specially built electronic flash, he photographed birds in flight at 1/5000th of a second. Finding his reaction times far too slow he asked scientist Philip Henry to make him the first automatic shutter release in Britain, for photography of birds in flight.

It was not until 1963, that he made his decision to work exclusively with the 35mm format. After testing a number of cameras, in 1974 he changed to Olympus, using the evolving system right up to the time his death at eighty-one.

As his reputation soared, the quality of his work went with it. Having photographed virtually every bird in Britain, he was invited by the big names in ornithology to join them on many major expeditions throughout the world.

Deservedly feted for his photographic skills, as with his many other talents, carried with modesty and charm Eric Hosking was, undeniably, a great gentle man of 20th century photography.'

Foreword by David Hosking

Eric Hosking OBE Hon FRPS FBIPP (1909-1991) was widely acknowledged as one of the world's most eminent natural history photographers. 1929 saw the start of my late father's career. I joined the family business in 1976, so after 92 years of two generations taking and selling wildlife photographs, I have reached retirement and find there is too much to move with.

The equipment, some of it made well over a hundred years ago, reflects the development of photography over the twentieth century. It also shows my father's passion for trying out all the latest equipment, to see if it would help take better bird photographs.


My father's interests, however, were not confined simply to natural history photography; they ranged across a wide spectrum of matters ornithological. He was always keenly interested in painters and bird art. Some of his most treasured possessions were paintings, which he had gathered together often from the artists themselves, like Thorburn, Tunnicliffe and Shackleton. He was an avid collector of books and his shelves were a treasure trove of ornithological volumes, many items of considerable historical interest in their own right, and many more containing his photographs.

Shortly after my father died we registered the Eric Hosking Charitable Trust. The aims of the Trust are to sponsor natural history and ornithological research through the media of writing, photography, painting or illustration. Over 50 bursaries have been given and some of the proceeds from the auction will help fund future projects.

An extremely rare survival, one of perhaps 30 examples of an English folding almanac known to be extant, nearly all of which are confined to major institutional collections; intended for practical use by physicians, who used astrological calculations to establish prognoses and the most auspicious timings for medical interventions, their form allowed them to be suspended from the waist for quick reference, hence the alternative name of 'girdle book'.

'From an analysis of the saints' days and festivals it would appear that [the present] calendar was made for use in the Canterbury diocese (thus confirming the south England emphasis of the astronomical calculations' e.g. St Augustine of Canterbury, in red, on 26th May, the Translation of the relics of St Thomas on 7th July, St David 1st March, St Chad, 2nd March (both of whose feasts were made obligatory in 1398), St Dunstan, on 19th May, St John of Beverley on 7th March, and other English saints' (J. P. Harthan, Assistant Keeper of the Library, Victoria & Albert Museum, typescript description, 1960, provided with the lot).

'Folded almanacs must have been common in later medieval England; however, few still exist, because of their small size and the wear and tear caused by folding and unfolding them. Most of those that do survive seem to have been intended for physicians, yet others seem to have been produced for less sophisticated users... Astrology had a vital role in medieval medicine, because an understanding of the stars was believed to be essential to determine the best timing for various medical procedures' (Pamela Robinson, 'A "very curious Almanack": the gift of Sir Robert Moray FRS, 1668', *Notes and Records of the Royal Society* (2008), Vol. 62, pp. 301-314).







A set of charming responses to what was presumably a maddening stream of letters from eccentric autograph collector and hotelier Eileen Cond (1911-1984), of The Den, Henley-in-Arden, Warwickshire, later of Yew Tree House, Ombersley, Worcestershire. In addition to granting Cond's requests for his signature (either in copies of his books or on her personal bookplate), Charteris provides interesting updates on the progress of the 'Saint' stories and reveals among other things his misgivings about ever allowing them to be filmed: 'I don't know when you'll see the Saint on the screen, because I know too much about the movie business even to put him at their mercy. I should require a controlling interesting myself; but I haven't yet said that to a potential buyer who didn't forthwith run away howling' (February 1934). Cond seems eventually to have insinuated herself well enough into Charteris's life to have become part of his fiction: 'You know, I actually did use your sister Meryl's name in one of my books – I only wish I could remember which one it was' (October 1947).




A group of warm and candid letters to Eileen Cond (see previous lot), dating back to the very beginning of Wheatley's career. He provides detailed updates on the progress, publication and sales of his books and novels, and freely imparts his opinions on their relative merits: 'I am glad to say that "Such Power is Dangerous" has already gone into it's [sic] 3rd impression and generally speaking the reviews have been most kind. Personally I do not like it as much "The Forbidden Territory" but there is plenty of excitement in it and some people seem to like it better' (June 1933); 'I am particularly attached to "Old Rowley" because it is a book that I have wanted to write all my life, but "Black August" is by far the most ambitious thing which I have attempted yet' (January 1934). Of particular interest is a splenetic four-page critique of the screen version of *The Forbidden Territory*, which Wheatley believed to have been bowdlerised to avoid upsetting Russia, newly acceded to the League of Nations (December 1934). A great bibliophile himself, Wheatley also muses on book collecting and the future value of his own works: '[The Forbidden Factory] may possibly be of some interest by the time you are an old lady of eighty – just because it is a first edition of a first book – and in this particular instance [...] half the number were issued without the map and the bulk of the remainder went to the libraries where they will be battered out of recognition. If it does therefore ever become of any interest copies in mint state will be very rare indeed' (April 1933).

Jefferson Farjeon was a prolific crime and mystery writer. Picture Descriptions

The forename(s) (or asterisks where not known) and surname of the artist indicates, in our opinion, a work by the artist named.

The initials of the forename(s) and the surname of the artist indicates in our opinion a work of the period of the artist which may be wholly or in part his work.

The following terms apply in our determination of a picture description:

- (a) "Attributed to" - is in our opinion probably a work by the artist.
- (b) "Studio of" - is in our opinion a work from the studio of the artist which may or may not have been executed under his direction.
- (c) "Circle of" - is in our opinion a work of the period of the artist executed under his immediate influence.
- (d) "Follower of" - is in our opinion a work by a painter working in the artist's style, contemporary or nearly contemporary, but not necessarily his pupil.
- (e) "Manner of" - is in our opinion a work in a style related to that of the artist, but of a later date.
- (f) "School accompanied by the name of a place or country and a date" - means that in our opinion the picture was executed at that time and in that location; e.g. Flemish School, 17th century.
- (g) "After" - an artist is in our opinion a copy of any date after a work by that artist.
- (h) "Signed and/or dated and/or inscribed means that in our opinion the signature and/or date and/or inscription" - are from the hand of the artist.
- (i) "Bears signature and/or dated and or inscription means that in our opinion the artist's name and/or date and/or inscription" - have been added by another hand.
- (j) All references to signature, inscriptions and dates refer to the present state of the work.
- (k) Dimensions are given height before width and do not include the frame
- (l) Pictures are framed unless otherwise stated.

Droit de Suite/ Artists' Resale Rights

All items in this catalogue that are marked with "✓" are potentially qualifying items, and the royalty charge (set out below) will apply if the Hammer Price is more than the UK sterling equivalent of €1,000. The royalty charge will be added to purchase invoices, and must be paid before items can be cleared. All royalty charges are paid to either the Design and Artists Copyright Society ("DACS") or the Artists' Collecting Society ("ACS") by the auctioneers, and no handling costs or additional fees with respect to these changes will be retained by the auctioneer.
